FIVE-YEARLY REPORT (2019-2024)

Mission: The mission of the FICSP is to promote the quality of content of publications in the fields of anatomy worldwide. Publishing activities in the anatomical sciences will be strengthened by encouraging communication, collaboration, and sharing of resources among the journals, through a forum for Editors of the official journals of the Associations to communicate and exchange information of mutual interest and concern.

According to our mission and five-year strategic plan, FICSP report for 2019-2024 is as follows:

1. Membership Expansion:

FICSP has expanded its membership to include more member societies, growing from 14 members in 2019 to 22 members in 2024. New members from Russia, Africa, Japan, Italy, India, and Poland have joined FICSP.

2. Discussions on Recommendations and New Ideas:

Conducted via Zoom and e-mail correspondences to enhance the quality of publication content, focusing on publication ethics, based on recent papers/documents including:

- Acknowledgement of the use of human cadavers in research papers (Iwanaga et al., 2021).
- IFAA's guidelines on the use of cadavers during the pandemic (IFAA Statement on COVID-19).
- IFAA recommendations for the ethical use of anatomical images (Cornwall et al., 2023).
- Recommendations for Good Practice Around Human Tissue Image Acquisition and Use in Anatomy Education and Research' (2023).
- Responsible research in anatomy: Attributes relevant to body donors and human tissues sourced from them (Ghosh and Walocha, 2024).

3. Contributions to PLEXUS:

Information and links for FICSP webinars, documents for the latest issues of FICSP journals, and links to abstracts from anatomy meetings in 2020.

4. Webinars:

FICSP hosted four webinars on publishing in anatomy journals, on Zoom, open to all members of the anatomy scientific community. These events were preregistered, with over 600 anatomists registering for some webinars. Recordings of these webinars were uploaded and are available on the IFAA website.
